Pastor's Pen

Dear Friends,

Abraham Joshua Heschel wrote, "Our goal should be to live life in radical amazement. ... get up in the morning and look at the world in a way that takes nothing for granted. Everything is phenomenal; everything is incredible; never treat life casually. To be spiritual is to be amazed." When I read it while sitting quietly in a comfortable chair and a cup of coffee I say, "Yes, Amen." When I run across it in the middle of a hectic and frustrating day I think, "he didn't mean a day like this!" How can anyone be amazed at bills, budgets, difficult colleagues, grumpy family members, and all those things we wish were different on any given day? I am working on being amazed each day, or at least on the lookout for amazing things. A local Freehold officeholder is helping me shift my perspective. He recently said that he appre-



ciates all those people who make his job difficult. This included the clergyperson who he had just been debating. He was sincere. Through our differences, he is convinced, we arrive at better solutions.

Henri Nouwen had a similar observation when he wrote "my whole life I have been complaining that my work was constantly interrupted until I discovered that my interruptions were my work".

Looking at the world expecting to be amazed helps me hear Paul's words in Philippians, "Rejoice in the Lord always," as an invitation and not an impossibility. Looking for God even in frustrations can help to embrace the struggles and still say, "Thank you" as each day ends.
